Conference of European Statisticians (CES)

- Founded in 1953, stems from the first Conference of Statistics held under the League of Nations in 1928
- Chief Statisticians in 65 countries and organizations
- Steered by the CES Bureau (9 countries and 6 international organizations)

Objective

- To advance official statistics at the national and international levels in the region.

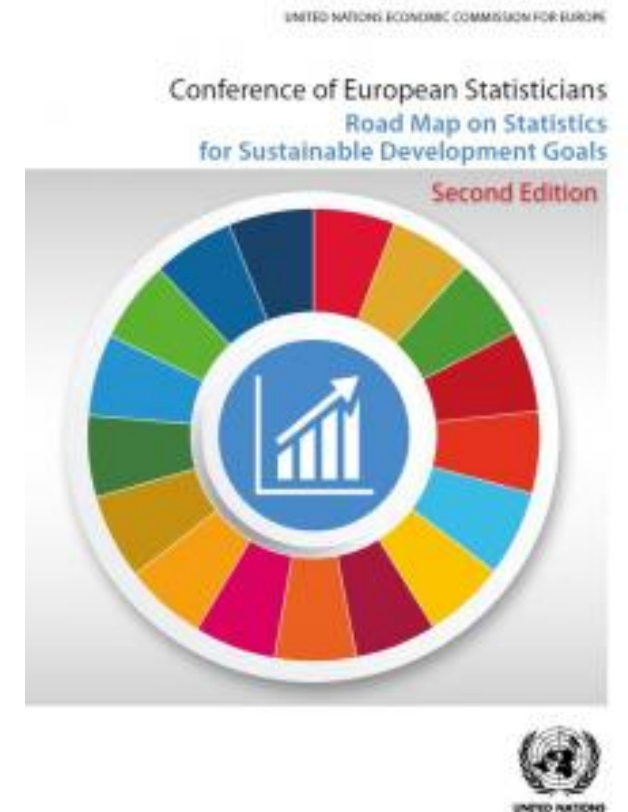
CES Steering Group on Statistics for Sustainable Development Goals

- Provides guidance to countries on statistical follow-up to 2030 Agenda
- 16 Countries, 3 international organizations
- Co-chairs: Sweden & Spain.

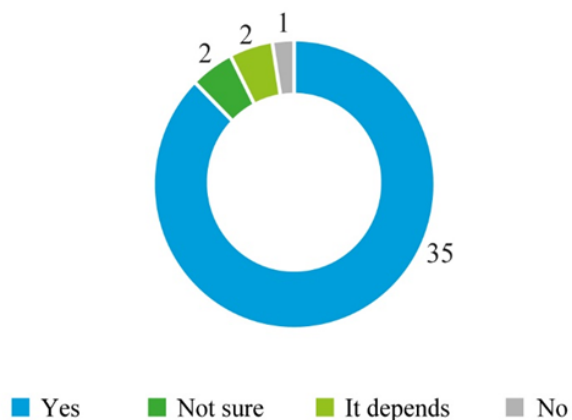

Lessons Learned - Timeline

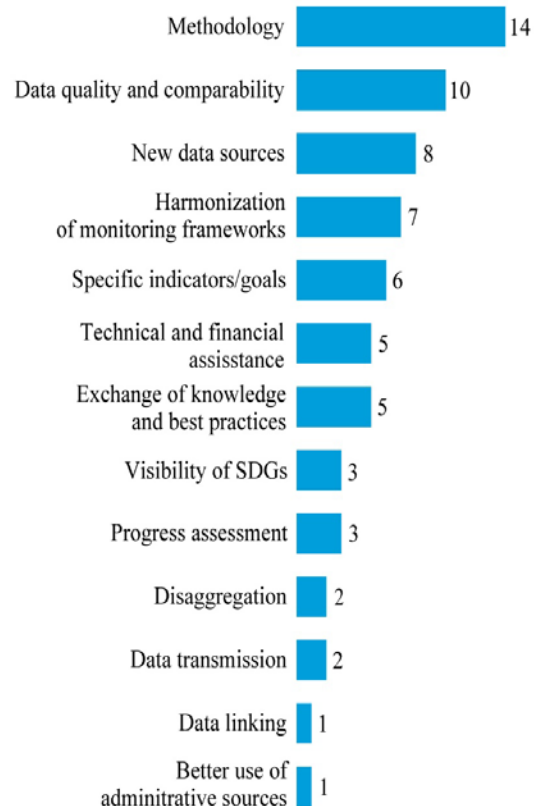
- Feb 2024: Request by CES Bureau for an in-depth review; shortly after the Steering Group established the Task Team.
- May 2024: Consultation of all UNECE member states on challenges, lessons learned and related practices
- Oct 2024: UNECE Workshop and Expert Meeting on Statistics for SDGs in Tirana
- Feb 2025: Discussion in the CES Bureau and paper gets published.
- March 2025: Side event to the UN Statistical Commission
IAEG-SDGs established a Task Team on Lessons Learned
- ...
- May 2025: Consultation on the paper (deadline 23 May)
- June 2025: Discussion at the plenary session of the CES

Recommendations II

- Foster an environment for sharing knowledge on challenging SDG metrics, such as through:
 - 1) workshops to highlight country-specific solutions
 - 2) publications detailing proxies and national indicators used to bridge SDG data gaps
- Exploring international developments in Big Data to familiarize countries with global solutions and facilitate the transfer of specialized Big Data knowledge, expertise and skills within the region.
- Development of a repository of good practices & tools for the quality assessment of alternative data sources.

Recommendations II

- Development of **guidance** for NSOs on how to **assess progress** towards SDGs
- Integrating examples of best practices into the agendas of SDG-related meetings, showcasing how NSOs **secure political interest, support and resources**.
- Examining current efforts to identify, track and address data **user needs**, aiming to help NSOs develop effective SDG communication strategies and enhance the visibility of SDGs

Post-2030 agenda

Advocate for the statistical follow-up of a post-2030 agenda:

- a) a continued strong mandate for NSOs,
- b) defining measurable policy targets,
- c) identifying possible data sources early,
- d) leveraging and formalizing the relationship with thematic indicator frameworks and other important sets of indicators, such as those developed to go beyond GDP,
- e) clearly defining the relationship between statistics and other components of the follow-up and review (such as the Voluntary National Reviews) of a possible post 2030 policy agenda
