

Take immediate and effective measures to eradicate forced labour, end modern slavery and human trafficking and secure the prohibition and elimination of the worst forms of child labour, including recruitment and use of child soldiers, and **by 2025 end child labour in all its forms**






WHAT IS CHILD LABOUR?

According to the definition of the International Labour Organization (ILO) Convention, **child labour is any activity that is mentally, physically, socially or morally dangerous or harmful to children**, deprives children of the opportunity to attend school and is performed by children below the minimum age (set at 15 years).

- Gainful labour of children under 14 years of age (light labour – up to 12 years of age)
- Harmful and dangerous work for children
- Activities that interfere with education
- Activities prohibited by law





International Standards and Guidelines for Measuring Child Labour



UN Convention on Human Rights (1989)

Ratified by 154 countries - child labour exploitation is prohibited

- □ILO Convention No. 138 and ILO Recommendation No. 146
- on the minimum age for admission to employment (1973)

the minimum age for admission to employment shall not be lower than the minimum age for completion of compulsory schooling.

LIC Convention No. 182 and ILO Recommendation No. 190

on the prohibition and immediate action for the elimination of the worst forms of child labour (1999)

In 2020, for the first time in history of ILO, an international labour standard was ratified by all 187 member states of the Organization






International Programme on the Elimination of Child Labour (IPEC)



The flagship programme of the International Labour Organization (ILO), which is responsible for assisting countries in this regard and for compliance monitoring

IPEC primary goal is the gradual elimination of child labour worldwide. Particular attention is paid to the eradication of the worst forms of exploitation, including slavery, forced labour, child trafficking, debt bondage, serfdom, prostitution, pornography and hazardous work.





"Children in Azerbaijan" (15-19 working youth)

Labour Code of Azerbaijan: It is prohibited to involve children under 15 years of age in labour activities. Children over 15 years of age may be involved in work only with the consent of their parents, but taking into account certain points of the regulations



Child labour. Armenia



Labour Code of the Republic of Armenia :

- It is prohibited to enter into an employment contract with citizens under 14 years of age, as well as to engage them in work
- Minors between the ages of 14 and 16 may work under a temporary employment contract, but only with the written consent of one of the parents.

Labour Code: One of the main principles of the labour legislation of the Republic of Kazakhstan is the prohibition of discrimination, forced labour and the worst forms of child labour in the Republic of Kazakhstan. An employment contract is concluded with a minor, aged 14 years, as well as with a parent, guardian, trustee or adoptive parent. At the same time, for employees under 18 years of age, reduced working hours are established.

Programme on the Elimination of Child Labour (ILO-IPEC).

According to this study, in Tajikistan about 120 thousand children aged 5 to 11 years are forced to work. At that time, there were 2.2 million children under 17 in the country, the share of workers was 23.4% or 522 thousand. Child labour is more common in rural areas. In villages, children are taught from an early age to help their elders with the housework. During the cotton harvest season, if the district is behind schedule, even schoolchildren go out to the fields.

The Labor Code sets the minimum age for employment at 15 years. A separate section is devoted to protecting the rights of workers under 18 years of age.

In the autumn of 2024, ILO experts conducted a study of cotton harvesting in Turkmenistan


Some results of the study:

- In 2024, the government of Turkmenistan added the professions of "cotton picker" and "cotton grower" to the list of jobs with harmful and hazardous working conditions prohibited for all persons under 18 years of age.
- ILO observers confirmed the involvement of children in cotton picking in all regions on 23% of the farms they visited.



Child labour. Uzbekistan





In March 2022, the ILO announced that cotton picking in Uzbekistan would no longer be carried out using child labour. This ban was also enshrined in the Constitution of Uzbekistan, adopted in 2023

Uzbekistan has taken steps to eradicate child labour. A legal framework has been created for this purpose, which has received high praise from the international community
